



#### Mayor Pledges to Rebuild and Fortify Coast

New York City, still reeling from the
impact of Hurricane Sandy, will avpand its evacuation zones, lighten
building codes and look for ways to
fortify critical infrastructure like
transportation and electrical networks from future natural disasters,
Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg said
Thursday.

But while the mayor said he would
aggressively oursue a rebuilding of

aggressively pursue a rebuilding of the damaged waterfront, he warned the damaged waterfront, he warned that "there are no panaceas or magic bullets" to protect the city fully. And while he did, for the first time, specifi-cally suggest dunes or levees as protective measures worth exploring, he again dismissed the use of expensive experiments like sea gates stretching across New York Harbor. It was Mr. Bloomberg's first major

It was Mr. Bloomberg's first major address on what the city should do in a post-hurricane world that, after the end of 2013, will also be a post-Bloomberg world. And the speech, which was televised live from a Lower Manhattan hotel that had been closed for two weeks because of the storm, had the bearing of a future-oriented State of the City event, with accompanying slides and even a surprise guest: for-mer Vice President Al Gore.

Mr. Gore, now an environmental activist, repeatedly lavished praise on

the mayor for his work on responding to climate change, saying he does not "know of anybody who has done more." Mr. Gore, a Democrat, even gently childed the Obama administration: "We cannot have four more years of mentioning this occasionally," he said.

Mr. Bloomberg, an independent, offered a much kinder assessment, saying the federal government had been very responsive to the damage wrought by Hurricane Sandy. But he also repeatedly sought to temper expectations of a quick solution, at one point stating bluntly, "Saying we're going to spend whatever it takes just is not realistic."

Among other ideas, Mr. Bloomberg said the city would consider the construction of dunes, jetties, levees an berms along coastal areas to help r duce damage from future stor surges. He did not specify where a such barriers would be bult, my less how much these would cost. aides to the mayor said that t' deputy mayors — Howard Wol Linda I. Gibbs and Robert K. St. bad recently traveled to New Orleans and met with officials there to discuss

Height restrictions on some resi-dential homes would be relaxed, Mr. Bloomberg said, so owners can ele-vate their houses above the flood plain. He also said the city would up-date its building code to require more stringent protection against floods. In stringent protection against floods. In particular, Bloomberg officials said that residential buildings — including






Image: Mayor Bloomberg announces PlaNYC














