## Preface

The lack of clear and accepted methods and mechanisms for incorporating the economic value of biodiversity in decisions on land use and in the prices of products is one of the main causes of loss of biodiversity. That is why the theme “Paying for Biodiversity” is a priority in the recently published Dutch Policy Programme on Biodiversity 2008 –2011, “***Biodiversity Works for Nature, for People, for Always***”. The policy document also emphasizes the internationally active role played by the Netherlands in stopping biodiversity loss and contributing to the realization of the Millennium Development Goals. Under the theme “Paying for Biodiversity”, the Netherlands government will carry out activities to improve Access and Benefit Sharing in relation to biodiversity, to establish clear pricing and payment for products and services derived from nature, and to set criteria for unsustainable use of biodiversity, e.g. through compensation. Other priorities of the Policy Programme include *Sustainability of Production Chains, Ecological Networks* and *Marine Biodiversity*.

The policy programme highlights the importance of the active involvement and co-responsibility of civic society groups and the private sector in the development and implementation of the programme, and calls for *New Coalitions for Biodiversity* to enhance coordination and collaboration between these actors and government bodies. In the Netherlands a wide range of organizations (governmental, private, profit and non-profit) are involved - directly or indirectly - in the various aspects of financing of the conservation and sustainable management of forests, biodiversity and nature in developing countries in the tropics. They include financial corporations and funds, broker firms, social and environmental NGOs, private companies involved in forest growing, harvesting, trading, processing and marketing, consultancy firms, knowledge and research institutions and government institutions. Taken as a whole, they represent a wealth of knowledge, experience and creativity as well as an extensive network of expertise and institutional contacts and capacities. Though the amount of knowledge and experience that organizations represent is enormous, their activities are not necessarily well coordinated. If they all worked together, the benefits would undoubtedly be even greater.

Given the growing interest in this theme, and the number of activities of Netherlands-based organizations aiming to promote the adequate financing of forests and nature in the tropics, the need for a “Who’s who and Who is doing what?” guide was increasingly felt. This guide brings together brief information on some 90+ organizations active in this field. It provides contact details of the organizations and a brief description of their main activities and objectives.

Expertise Centre Triple E prepared the Guide at the request of the Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality, and under the umbrella of the *Knowledge for International Policy Support Programme* of Wageningen University and Research Centre.

As the first attempt to bring together such information, **this Guide makes no claim to be complete, nor can it be regarded as a “green list of approved organizations”**. Instead, it should be considered as an evolving activity that needs to be completed and updated periodically. Organizations not yet included in this issue are invited to submit their information to the **BioWie** website: [www.bio-wie.nl](http://www.bio-wie.nl). BioWie is the Dutch digital Who’s who guide to people and organizations involved in biodiversity and biodiversity policy. We hope that this guide will be helpful to all those working in the field of financing sustainable forest and nature management in the tropics, and will contribute to enhanced exchange, coordination and collaboration among these parties.

We gratefully acknowledge the help of all those who have contributed to this Guide.

## Criteria, classification and scope of the inventory

### Selection criteria

The selection of organizations, institutions, and companies (hereafter named organizations) was based on the following set of criteria selected by the project team and the ministry of LNV:

- The organization is based in The Netherlands and operates under Dutch law;
- The organization is actively involved in activities directly or indirectly related to the financing of forests and nature<sup>1</sup> management in developing/tropical countries<sup>2</sup>, including the following fields: plantations, concessions, natural forest management, the buying and selling of (forest) ecosystem products and services (timber, NTFPs, carbon, biodiversity and other ecosystem services), forest conservation, knowledge exchange, and development and capacity building.

### Inventory

Using the above-mentioned criteria, a desktop inventory was carried out to select the organizations to be included in this inventory. During this research, public databases and Internet were used and short interviews with experts were conducted.

Based on the set of criteria, 101 organizations have been included and grouped in the following 8 categories (in alphabetical order, with the number of organizations between brackets):

- Consultants and Research institutions (22)
- Energy and carbon (11)
- Financial organizations (12)
- Timber trade sector (5)
- Governmental organizations (6)

<sup>1</sup> In this inventory we used the terms “forest” and “nature” in relation to the organizations in a broad way, including organizations that mentioned nature or forests in their activities/investments.

<sup>2</sup> The terms “developing country” and “tropical country” were used broadly: all organizations that employ any activity related to nature/forests in these countries were included in the inventory.

- Non governmental organizations (32)
- Other commercial businesses (2)
- Forest and Plantation funds (11)

This grouping is based on the categories used by Statistics Netherlands (CBS) and narrowed down by the project team and LNV. The number of categories was restricted for practical reasons: classifying the organizations into more categories would dilute the results.

The types of organization vary according to their activities: they range from organizations directly involved in the management of forests, through those which are dependent on buying products from forest resources, to broker and consultancy firms and NGOs lobbying for more sustainable use from a more distant and independent position. This shows that the sector is characterized by a diverse set of stakeholders and parties.

### **How to use this Guide**

The guide can be searched by category (8). Within each category, the organizations are listed in alphabetical order. The information on the individual organizations is organized as follows:

- Name of the organization;
- Mission of the company/ institution/ organization;
- Address;
- Website and;
- General e-mail address.

### **Scope and Status of this Guide**

It is emphasized that the listing of an organization in this Guide does not imply any judgement, whether positive or negative, of the organization's functioning, or its behaviour on ethical and/or sustainability issues.

For practical reasons, in a number of cases only the umbrella organization has been included in this Guide, e.g. the VVNH and FSC NL. Information on their member organizations can be easily accessed on their respective websites ([www.vvnh.nl](http://www.vvnh.nl); [www.fsc.nl](http://www.fsc.nl)).

As a new venture - and given the time and money available - this edition of the guide does not pretend to be complete, but should be seen as work in progress, and a first step towards a comprehensive guide of relevant organizations.

## **Brief overview of the main developments in the sector**

In the following, we present a brief overview of the different categories of organizations involved in the financing of forests and nature in tropical countries, and sketch the context and some general tendencies so as to locate the categories of organizations within the whole spectrum of activities targeting the financing of forests and nature in the tropics. The overview makes no claim to completeness, nor is it intended to express any value judgments.

### **Consultants and Research Institutions**

The rise in awareness of sustainability, and the impact of the economy on the environment has boosted the consulting market on investments in forests, and green investments in general. There is a general trend towards making operations as 'green' as possible. A headline in a leading Dutch newspaper (NRC) stated that companies are headhunting NGO workers to staff their CSR departments.

Consulting companies in the sector provide expertise in reducing ecological footprints, the drafting of CSR and procurement policies, and investments in sustainable (forestry) projects. Other consultants offer companies the expertise to produce and/or import sustainable timber, for which the market is growing.

The focus of Dutch research institutions is twofold: technical/ecological/silvicultural and socio-economic/policy. 'Technical' research is conducted all over the world by universities and contributes to the general understanding of forests and how they can best be managed, used and/or conserved. Socio-economic and policy research helps all sectors involved in international forestry to improve their policies, the institutional environment and management.

### **Energy and carbon**

The increase in demand for 'green energy' has encouraged energy companies to increase supply and diversify their services. Every company and citizen can now get 'green energy'. The energy comes from windmills and hydropower, and also from biomass. Large volumes of palm oil and soy are used for energy production. However, the production of these commodities may have side effects, including the conversion of forests into plantations.

The market for CO<sub>2</sub> compensation is growing due to the need to lower emissions of climate gases, and CO<sub>2</sub> in particular. Most of the money flows into 'cleaner'

technologies, as stipulated under the Kyoto protocol. One percent of the money on the international Kyoto market flows to sustainable forest projects, while in the international voluntary market this is as much as to 36%. Companies, governments and private individuals compensate for their air travel by planting trees, and there is a demand for making offices and businesses 'climate neutral' by planting trees. These developments have led to an increase in companies active within this segment of the sector, and growth for those already present.

### **Timber trade sector**

The demand for timber has been increasing over the years. Most Dutch timber-importing companies do not extract the timber from concessions of their own; there are just three companies, which do have their own concessions outside The Netherlands. The VVNH (Dutch Council for Timber Traders) has approximately 150 members, of whom 70 import their own timber, while the others import through other traders.

The VVNH has stipulated that by the end of 2009, 75% of all imported timber should be sustainably produced. This is a driving force behind the growing Dutch demand for sustainably produced and harvested timber. The Dutch state is another driving force behind the growing demand, which has its effect on importing companies as well. A third factor is the consumers, who are also becoming increasingly aware (due to NGO campaigns) of the need for sustainable (and certified) timber.

### **Financial organizations**

Over the last few years, financial corporations have become more aware of their role in trade chains and the impact of their activities. One of the effects of this has been the establishment of the internationally accepted Equator Principles. Some banks have developed policies per sector, detailing when investments can be done and loans provided. A clear example is the soy sector, where almost all banks now demand that their customers do not clear forests or High Conservation Value Areas.

Consumer demand for sustainable financial products has also risen, due to increased awareness of ecosystem degradation. All players in the sector now offer sustainable banking, investments and other 'green' products.



Financial institutions play an important role in the carbon market. Most money flows to cleaner technologies (like windmills) but some of that money is invested in trees (which capture carbon). This provides forest owners with extra means.

### **Governmental organizations**

In 2008, the Dutch government published its new Biodiversity Policy (BB), detailing the focal areas for Dutch international biodiversity policy, including payments for ecosystem services and sustainable trade chains. In addition to this, there is the focus of the ministry of foreign affairs on the Millennium Development Goals, of which MDG 7 is of most relevance to forests.

The Netherlands spends 0.1% of its national income on nature conservation, and part of this is spent on forests. The state is also developing a new procurement policy on timber, shifting the demand curve towards sustainability.

### **Non governmental organizations**

Within the Netherlands, there is a plethora of NGOs working on social and environmental issues related to forests in other countries. The property rights of indigenous groups, equal income distribution, and sustainable use, are just a few of the topics covered. The focus is on sustainable development, both for people and for the forest. Projects are funded through private and institutional donors, and complemented by joint projects between NGOs and private companies, as well as PPPs.

The aim of most climate projects is to attract sustainable income to finance nature conservation and sustainable development. REDD is now adding to this movement, offering opportunities but also posing threats. The funds becoming available for forest conservation can provide additional means for conservation, but can also lead to rising land prices and the exclusion of indigenous peoples.

### **Other Commercial Businesses**

There are other stakeholders amongst commercial enterprises that depend strongly on ecosystem services. Multinationals and other internationally operating companies source their products from nature areas, and most companies have developed Corporate Social Responsibility policies on the sustainable extraction of resources, and team up with NGOs to put these into practice. Sectors that use coffee, palm oil and soy are now developing sustainability criteria to ensure a continued supply and live up to consumer expectations, while this has already been done for timber, for example.

## **Forest and Plantation Funds**

The market for funds that allow for investment in plantations and natural forests (either direct or indirect) in The Netherlands is substantial. This sector totals between € 650 million and € 1.35 billion, growing by 200 million a year. Plantations are seen as 'alternative investment objects' by investors. Of the 10 plantation funds, the financial watchdog of the Netherlands – the AFM<sup>3</sup> - has certified 3.
