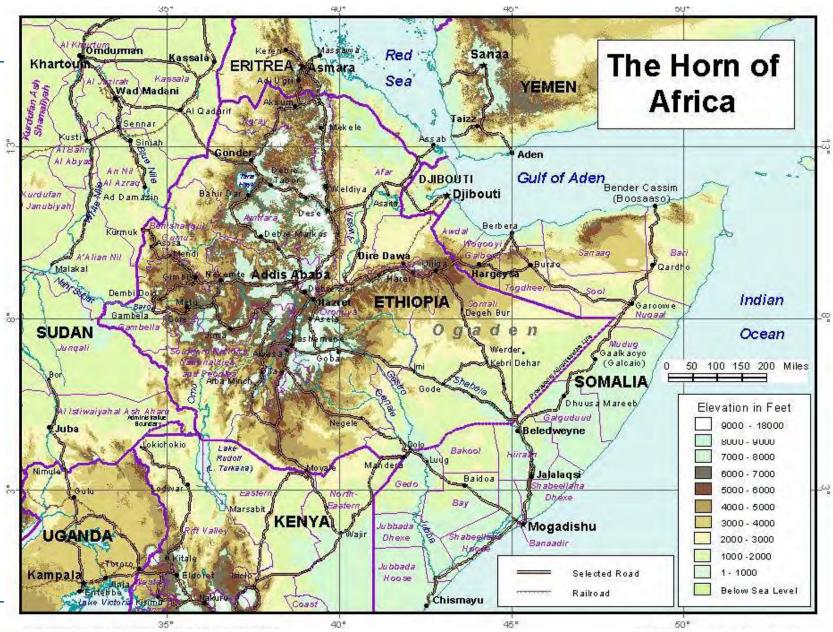




#### Livestock sector

- Livestock population:41 m cattle 25 m sheep 23 m goats 43 poultry
- Main production systems:
  - Highland crop livestock mixed system
  - Lowland (agro-)pastoral system
- Main characteristics:
  - small scale subsistence
  - low growth rate and low off-take rate
  - sales are 'cash need driven'

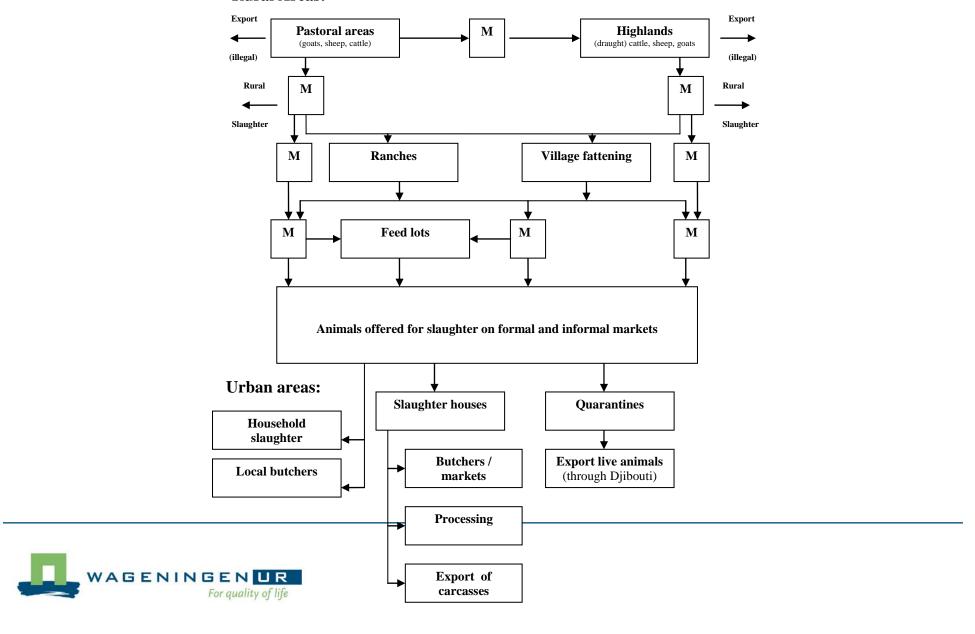

#### New developments

- Animal health and TAD (DFZ, zonation etc.)
- Activities of AU-IBAR

#### New value chains

- Export of good quality chilled or frozen meat
- Quality meat for the top segment of the local market
- Processed products for export and local market
- Export of finished leather and leather products



#### Conditions for successful cooperation

- Find a good partner for long-term cooperation
- Cover as many steps of supply chain as possible
  - supply of good quality fattened animals (e.g. through producers organizations)
  - slaughterhouse / processing
  - chilling / freezing
  - transport
- Make use of Dutch support programmes



### Opportunities for Dutch Agribusiness

- Upgrading slaughterhouses, meat processing, cooling, storage transport
- Development of quality and foodsafety assurance systems, certification systems
- Upgrading of tanning/ finishing and leather processing
- Design and manufacture of leather products for export
