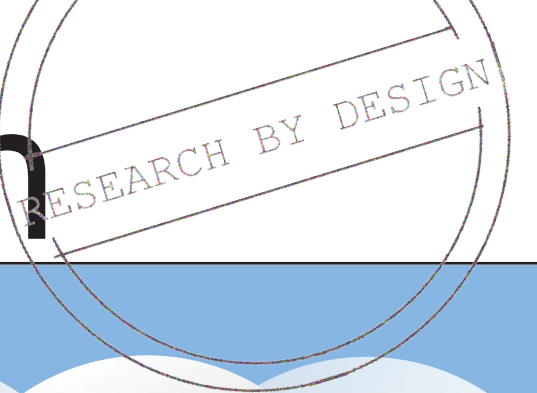
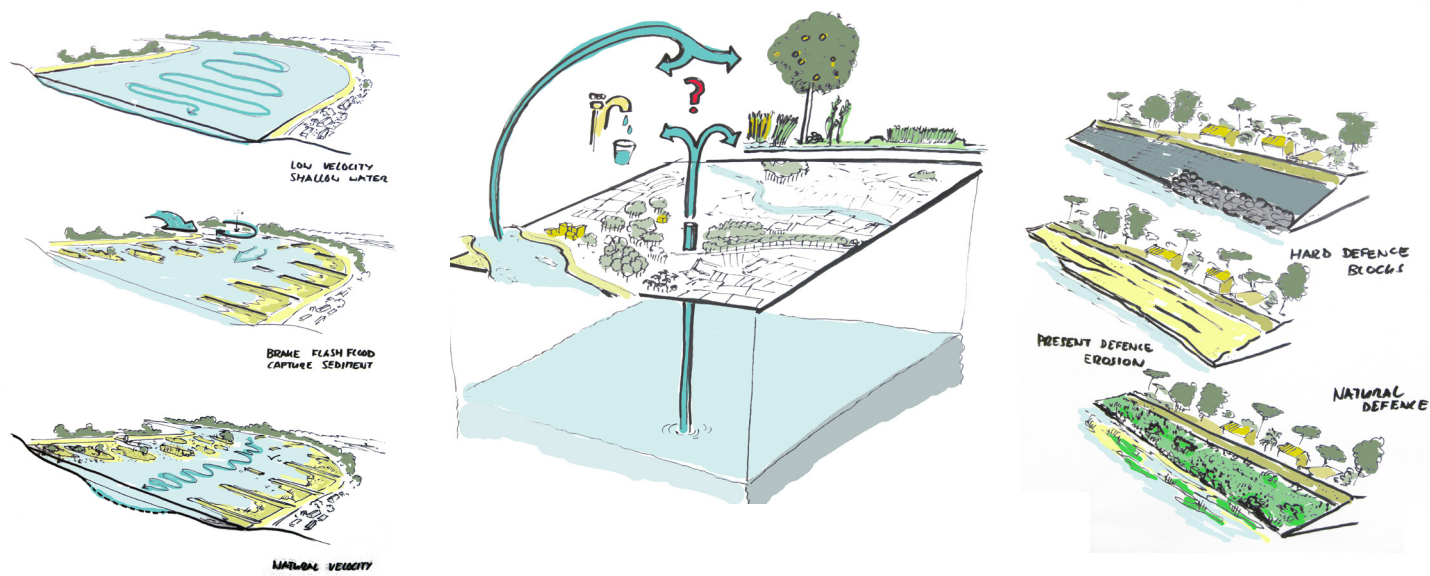


Delta Ateliers Bangladesh



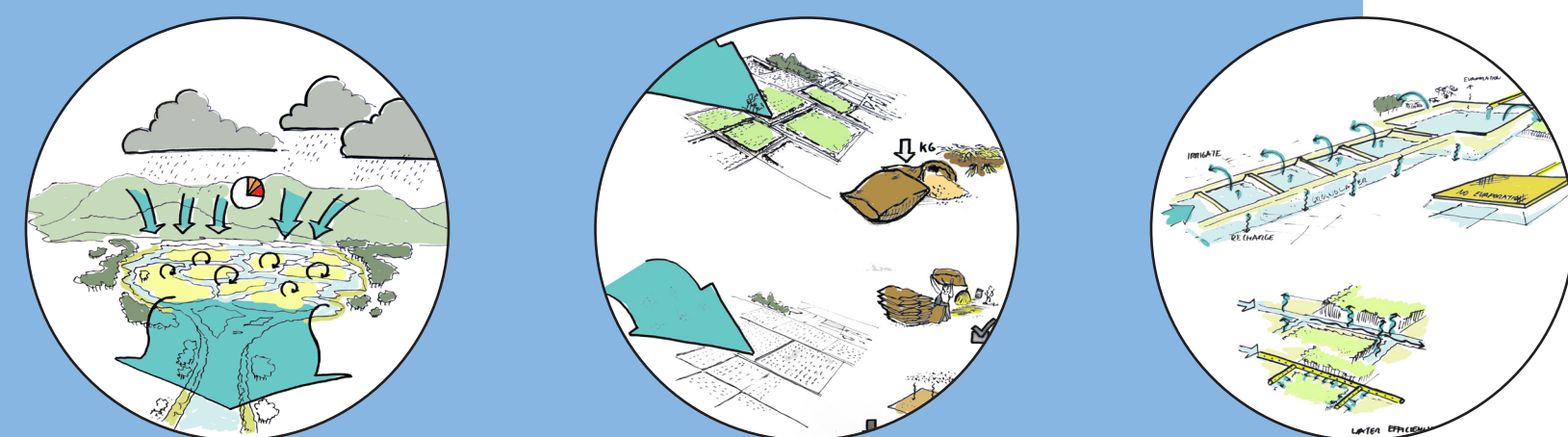
Bangladesh is the largest delta of the world. Its rivers and floodplains, which make up 80% of the country, support life, livelihoods and the economy. Bangladesh is a rapidly developing country, envisaging to be a middle-income country in 2021. The country faces major inter-related delta challenges in water safety, food security and socio-economic development and is prone to natural calamities such as floods, cyclones, and droughts. There is already high pressure on the available land and water resources in the delta.

The government of Bangladesh, in cooperation with the government of the Netherlands, aims to create the Bangladesh Delta Plan 2100. An international consortium BanDuDeltas is implementing the formulation of the Bangladesh Delta Plan 2100 and encompasses a wide range of expertise, both from the Netherlands and Bangladesh. The Bangladesh Delta Plan 2100 is formulated through a process that is adapted from the delta planning process as used in the Netherlands.

Vision, scenarios and strategies

Towards scenarios and strategies five hotspots are addressed, each with different characteristics. In May 2015, the team of Wageningen UR and CAS, facilitated the first two Delta Ateliers: hotspot Haors and hotspot Barind.

During the ateliers, local stakeholder gave not only reflections and complemented the outcomes of the baseline studies (problem statement), but also worked together on potential (integrative) solutions. This provides valuable input and a first step towards strategies.
