What is information literacy, and why is it important?

Information literacy is an academic skill contributing to the fundamentals of science.

An information literate person can

- search, find, evaluate, select, and manage scientific information effectively and efficiently, and communicate it ethically;
- contribute to society based on scientific insights and evidencebased information;
- thrive in a world in which information provision is ever changing; and
- use AI responsibly when searching for information.
